# Presented by Bob Olhsson - Former Motown Engineer and the AES PNW Section


ZOOM MEETING 6:00PM PST (UTC -8) Tuesday, 23 February 2021

Imagine being a fly on the wall at Hitsville Studios (aka Motown Studios). Bob Olhsson began his Motown Career in the cutting room at Hitsville where he interfaced with every part of the company: cutting, recording, mixing, and mastering. Gradually, he moved into doing all of those functions, while learning their unique approach to the record business. Remember, it was 1965 and studios were very homespun; the techniques we take for granted today were being invented!

It was truly an amazing wall, and an amazing time.

#### **About our Presenter**

Bob Olhsson spent 7 years at Motown. While he was there, he recorded and mastered nearly 100 top ten singles including 42 #1s. One of only two people to hold every



recording engineering position in the company, he worked on Stevie Wonder's first productions and Motown's first successful rock act, Rare Earth.

Leaving Motown for the San Francisco Bay Area in 1972, he landed at KPFA Radio, Berkeley/San Francisco where he mixed dozens of live jazz, folk and classical broadcasts, from Van Morrison to Weather Report. Later he was at the Quicksilver Messenger Service,

Marin County/San Francisco and built and then managed a 24 track recording studio for the Quicksilver Messenger Service band for over a decade. This included co-producing their last album for Capitol Records.

Next, he went to Hearts of Space Records, San Francisco where he digitally mastered most of the label's catalog of ambient, electronic and world music. A number of these titles were acclaimed as audiophile reference recordings. At AW Audio, Marin County/San Francisco he built the first Pro Tools motion picture post audio system in Northern California and worked as an editor at AW Audio. AW projects were mixed at Skywalker Ranch.

Going freelance in San Francisco, he worked on projects for Grateful Dead, Jerry Garcia Band, Graham Nash, Paul Butterfield Blues Band, Percy Mayfield, Ron Thompson, Harmonia Mundi Records and many others.

In 2001 Bob moved to Nashville. There he worked on projects for Keb' Mo', Orleans, Funk Brothers, Ray Manzarek, Ray Wylie Hubbard, Ian McLagan, The Blind Boys of Alabama, Beth Neilson Chapman, Freedy Johnston, BR 549, Fisk Jubilee Singers, Tim O'Brien, Karen Parks, Old Crow Medicine Show, Suzy Bogguss, Bettye Lavette, many others.

#### Please Note

In order to maintain decorum and avoid interruptions, even unintended ones, we have established a few ground rules for meeting attendees:

- 1. We want to see your full name on display in Zoom at the meeting.
- 2. The presenter will determine if they can accept questions during the presentation, or wait until specific Q&A times, and that will be announced at the beginning of the meeting. (We often use the "chat" feature to allow attendees to ask questions when they think of them, with moderators passing them on to the presenter at the appropriate time.)
- 3. Please mute your microphone when not talking (a moderator may mute you if you haven't muted yourself, if they do, Zoom won't let you un-mute until a moderator clears you again.)
- 4. Based on our experience with no-shows, we reserve the right to issue more tickets than available slots. We don't want to turn people away based on inaccurate estimates of attendance, but we do have budgetary limits to the number of slots we can make available. If we reach capacity before you log in, we regret that we have no way to expand capacity at the last minute.
- 5. Some presenters are distracted when confronted by a sea of video faces or other

- images, so for some meetings we may ask that you turn your camera/images off during the presentation. If you forget, one of our moderators may do it for you, and you may or may not get a private chat note informing you.
- 6. During the meeting, there is the matter of your camera. We're going to leave that up to the presenter; whether they want to see their audience while they present or not. If they want to see who they're talking to, then you can leave your camera live or not, as you prefer, however if the presenter doesn't want to see the audience, then we'll ask you to turn your video off.
- 7. Moderators have the ability to globally turn everyone's video off, however turning it back on is troublesome; we are forced to turn cameras back on manually, one by one. There is no way for you to override that. You'll need your camera live later in the meeting for the self-introductions.
- 8. Best is that if we ask for cameras to be on or off, that you do this individually on your own.
- 9. It would be good if you watched the chat stream during the meeting. Not only is it a way to submit questions to the presenters, but it's also a way for others to contact you personally. You have the option there to direct your comment to anyone who is part of the meeting as well as to one person in particular.

Finally, in the rare instance of behavior by an attendee that moderators believe is disruptive, we reserve the right to immediately eject such attendees.

We started holding our meetings via Zoom beginning with the April 2020 meeting. Zoom has dramatically increased our reach, well beyond our Section's geographic area. Since doing this, we've had attendees from Canada, and as far away as Indonesia, and Australia.
