May Meeting Notice History, Technical Aspects, & the Care & Feeding of Ribbon Microphones Presented By Sammy Rothman Sales & Marketing - AEA Ribbon Mics With Special Guest Wes Dooley

At our May meeting, Sammy Rothman from AEA Ribbon Mics will bring us an indepth presentation about a microphone that is regaining popularity in the digital age: The Ribbon Microphone. Invented in Germany in 1924 by Schottky (of Schottky diode fame), early models made by Western Electric and RCA began appearing in the United States in the early 1930s. RCA produced several different models until well into the 1970s. The RCA 44 and 77 microphones are perhaps the most iconic examples of the genre; their profiles are instantly recognizable and each microphone has a long and storied history.

By 1998, AEA was producing every component in the RCA 44 (they took up repair of RCA microphones after GE acquired RCA and then shuttered the microphone division), and the decision was made to introduce their own 44 microphone. Sammy will discuss the history of the AEA R44, the technical side of ribbon mics, and how they differ from condenser microphones. In the years to follow, AEA introduced several other models that were unique to them, and not recreations of previous RCA models, culminating in the Nuvo series of microphones, which are ribbon mics, but with a 2015 point of view.

Finally, we will audition several of these microphones, with an ear towards discerning the differences between different approaches.
