Decades ago, when our industry was in its infancy, there was no way to get formal education in Audio Engineering. You hung out at a studio, maybe and maybe you got a job sweeping floors, running coffee, etc. which maybe led to helping with setups, 2nd engineering, and some day: your first session. Or maybe you went out and got a degree in just about anything; Music or Electrical Engineering were obvious choices. Or perhaps you were a musician and were able to make the move to the other side of the glass.

Some studios started offering classes as a way to fill in blank spots in the schedule (and also as gofer bait). Many people got started that way. Via Tascam, others joined the home studio revolution. Only a few colleges and universities had any sort of audio engineering program. Interdisciplinary degrees were one of the options then. Formalized coursework was a natural outcome of this process, and today it's easy to find specific programs in specific parts of the field of Audio Engineering.
